Brian Wheeler, a Huron kid, has played guitar for sixty years. He has been inducted into the SD Rock and Roll Hall of Fame with three bands. He served as President prior to Mr. Cornette.

John Mogen's band, Mogen's Heroes, has played for more than 45 years. He plays piano, teaches piano lessons, and taught vocal music for 34 years in South Dakota. He's been inducted four times.

The mission of the South Dakota Rock and Roll Music Association is to honor the musicians, bands, promoters, booking agents and venues that helped to shape decades of Rock and Roll in South Dakota.

Showcasing these achievements is possible, in part, through our Hall of Fame display at the Washington Pavilion in Sioux Falls, SD.

This display serves to preserve and celebrate the rich heritage of Rock and Roll in our State. Visitors to the display will find a variety of instruments used by the bands plus a pictorial look back to some of the individuals and bands that traveled many miles every week to perform at some of the most iconic dance halls in the area. In addition, the display features an interactive video display where visitors can capture more details on who these bands were and what made a particular dance hall so special. It becomes a journey through time, reliving the memories and exploring the evolution of Rock and Roll in South Dakota.

Our display seeks to foster a sense of pride, to enhance and expand the history of how the vibrant music scene in South Dakota




emerged and continues to make a connection to an audience interested in the history of Rock and Roll.

The Mocamba Club

The Mocamba Club in Sioux Falls was one of the premier nightclubs in the Midwest. The Mocamba ran bands seven nights a week. Live music is what gave the Mocamba its reputation.

The first band hired in 1969 was the Big Thing. Owner Bud Brown found the band playing in another Sioux Falls club and hired them away. The Big Thing became Chicago Transit Authority, and later, Chicago. National acts included the big bands of Buddy Rich, Count Basie, Stan Kenton, Maynard Ferguson, Wood Herman, Don Ellis and Chase.



When local bands got the chance to play the Mocamba it meant that they had arrived to the "big time". Owner Bud Brown was very picky about his bands and they had to be extremely professional and talented. If you didn't have both, you didn't play at the Mocamba.

GLIDDEN MEMORIAL CHAPEL AT MT. PLEASANT CEMETERY: BY LOCAL LOU



Located within the gates of Mt. Pleasant Cemetery is a Sioux quartzite building that is on the National Register of Historic Places. It is the Glidden Memorial Chapel named for Daniel and Josephine Glidden.

Daniel and Josephine moved to Sioux Falls in 1878. They would end up spending the rest of their years together here with Daniel dying in 1920 and Josephine in 1921.

In life they were strong members of the community belonging to many organizations. In death Josephine left a bequest of \$13,000 to build a chapel and receiving vault at Mt Pleasant Cemetery.

It would take several years to get the 22 foot by 42 foot Glidden Memorial Chapel built due to access to the money that had been left for the chapel.

In December of 1924 the first body is held in the receiving. Eventually it falls into disrepair and even starts to be used as a maintenance shed. Currently the cemetery is fundraising for chapel repairs so it can be around for another 100 years.
